During the month it was my pleasure on behalf of the citizens of the town to welcome five new Australian citizens. This is such an uplifting experience. These people bring incredible enthusiasm and aspiration to our country and the town. Further details are provided elsewhere in this newsletter.

On 8 June Council will seek expressions of interest from organisations interested in investing in and operating the Council's water system. The primary objectives of this process are to reduce prices to Adelaide levels and to provide water security. It is the Council's expectation that if Adelaide prices cannot be achieved through this process that the State Government will subsidise the service to achieve this. There is a level of concern in the community that the Council is selling the water system. THIS IS NOT THE CASE. OWNERSHIP OF THE SYSTEM WILL REVERT TO THE COUNCIL AT THE END OF THE AGREEMENT.

The Commissioner responsible for liquor control was in Coober Pedy in May at the request of the Council. A number of meetings were held with various people. As a result, the Council resolved to approach various State Government officials - liquor control, health and policing

- about future required action. Further details are included later in this newsletter.

The Council conducted its third and final formal review of its budget and Council is required to do this three times each year. The Council's Audit Committee is also involved in the process. The Council is forecasting an underlying deficit of approximately \$367k at year end compared to a budgeted deficit of \$148k. The primary reason for the unfavourable result compared to budget is the impact of the pandemic on water sales. It compares extremely favourably to the annual underlying deficit of \$2.7 million inherited by this administration in 2019. Further details are provided later in this newsletter.

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Water Recycling

Council has been committed to recycling its waste water wherever possible. This year Council has been successful in irrigating the oval over a full seasonal cycle using a subsurface irrigation system. The use of waste water is only possible after the water has been treated to comply with the Australian Water Quality Standards.

The subsurface method of irrigation was used many years ago but was abandoned reputably due to technical difficulties with the water quality. The new subsurface system is using an abandoned subsurface seepage drainage system to transmit the water from below the ground surface to the root zone of the grass.

The use of recycled waste water to irrigate the oval avoids the use of expensive drinking water resulting in savings in operating costs. The Council has recycled 42.9 mega litres of waste water over the last 12 months.

Labyrinth

At the Council meeting on 22 September 2020, Council resolved to consult with the community regarding the creation of a labyrinth on land known as the Triangle. A public notice was published in the Adelaide Advertiser, Council's website, Council's Facebook page, Mail Chimp mail-out and the public noticeboards at the Post Office and IGA Supermarket on 15 April 2021. The closing date for submissions was 7 May 2021. No written submissions were received by the due date and no one has notified Council of a desire to make a verbal submission. The Administrator invited members of the public to make a submission on the by-laws at the meeting on 11 May 2021. One person spoke in

favour of the proposal and no one spoke against.

Council has granted consent for the Labyrinth project, subject to the Manager of Works and Water being satisfied with the governance, design, and WHS aspects of the project.

By-Laws

At the Council meeting on 13 April 2021, Council resolved to consult with the community regarding proposed by-laws numbered 1 to 8. A public notice was published in the Adelaide Advertiser, Council's website. Council's Facebook page. Mail Chimp mail-out and the public noticeboards at the Post Office and IGA Supermarket on 15 April 2021. The closing date for submissions was 7 May 2021. No written submissions were received by the due date and no one has notified Council of a desire to make a verbal submission. The Administrator invited members of the public to make a submission on the By-laws at the meeting on 11 May 2021. No one who was present at the meeting spoke.

The Dog and Cat Management Board is satisfied with By-law 5 Dogs and By-law 6 Cats and has declined to make a submission.

Council's lawyer has provided the required certificate attesting that Council has the legal authority to make the By-laws. This certificate was tabled at the meeting as Attachment 5.

The by-laws have been adopted by Council, and the following actions will now occur:

- a notice will be published in the Adelaide Advertiser and the Government Gazette;
- the Chief Executive Officer will sign two copies of the By-laws;
- a copy of the reports for the By-laws will be submitted to the Leg

islative Review Committee of the State Parliament within six Parliamentary sitting days of the Council's adoption of the By-laws;

- a separate register will be kept of all By-laws made or adopted by the Council;
- at a future Council meeting, Council will set by resolution expiation fees for breaches of the By-laws as the expiation fees are not set by the By-laws;
- at a future Council meeting, Council may, by resolution, authorise certain employees of the Council to grant permits under the Bylaws; and
- in accordance with Section
 132 of the Local Government Act
 1999, the Council will make its Bylaws available on the internet.

The By-laws will be effective four months after publication of the notice in the Gazette unless disallowed by Parliament.

Smart Meters

The Department of Energy and Mining has advised that the smart electricity meters are expected to arrive in Adelaide at the end of June. The meters are expected to be installed by Cowell Electric in June, July and August. In relation to billing, all customers will receive two electricity bills in September. One bill will cover the period from June 2021 to the date that the old meter was removed. The second bill will cover the period from the date the new meter was installed to the first week in September. This will not affect the amount that you otherwise would have paid had the meters not been changed over. Coober Pedy Quiet Achievers

Coober Pedy has a long history of attempting to put in place various plans to manage the supply and impacts of alcohol within the town. It needs to be recognised that this is an extremely sensitive topic for residents and service providers, and therefore it has been difficult to come to consensus as to how to move forward with workable plans.

The last attempt at an overall strategy and plan was *A Dry Change*: Coober Pedy Alcohol Strategy and Dry Area Review, which was completed in 2013.

Dini Soulio, Commissioner for Consumer and Business Services, and Zoe Thomas, Assistant Director for Licensing held conversations in Coober Pedy across 4-5 May 2021. Conversations were held with District Council, SAPOL and licensees. Initial conversations were also held with some community groups and services.

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Council Budget Review

Council undertook a review of its 2020/21 budget using financial results up to 30 April 2021. This review is the last before the end of the year.

A number of changes to the budget were approved by Council as a result of the review.

2020/21 has been a difficult year to manage Council's budget due the impact of COVID19. Council operates several commercial activities, and these have been badly affected. Council has used its best endeavours, and estimates that water and electricity income will be about 20% lower than budgeted for. Fortunately, the State Government underwrites the financial performance of the electricity operations and so the reduction in electricity income does not impact on Council's finances. However, Council expects to lose about \$230k in water income in 2020/21.

The reduction in income will be partially offset by lower expenses. Employee costs continue to be lower than expected, largely due to vacant positions. Payments for materials and contractors are lower. Some projects have not been able to be completed and there were savings in electricity costs.


Since adoption of the 2020/21 budget, the underlying deficit has increased by \$220k to a forecast result of \$367k. Council's expenditure on the renewal of its assets decreased even further to 20% of what it should be for the year. This is because Council has to spend all of its available cash on maintaining services and can only spend a little on renewing existing assets.

Full details of the budget review can be found in the Council Minutes for the meeting held on 25 May 2021. Council's financial position has been improving over the past years as the graph shows.
